These buildings often served dual purposes, acting not only as administrative offices but also as symbols of power and authority, influencing local governance and community relations.

Despite its importance, the historical narrative surrounding the Maina brick building has largely remained unexplored, leaving a gap in the scholarship on colonial architecture in Assam. Previous studies have focused on more prominent sites, neglecting the stories of smaller, yet equally significant, structures that embody the colonial legacy in regional contexts (Khan, 2010; Saikia, 2015). This research aims to bridge that gap by uncovering the hidden history of the Maina building through an exploration of its architectural features, historical context, and cultural implications.

Through a comprehensive analysis of existing literature and historical records, this paper will highlight the building's role in the colonial administrative landscape, its architectural significance, and its contemporary relevance within the community. By doing so, it seeks to contribute to the broader understanding of Assam's colonial heritage and emphasize the importance of preserving such historical sites for future generations.

Additionally, **Brahma (2018)** delves into the colonial administrative structures in Assam, discussing how these buildings facilitated governance and administration during the British Raj. This study provides a framework for examining the specific functions of colonial-era buildings in regional contexts, contributing to a deeper understanding of their significance beyond mere architecture.

Architectural historian **Khan (2010)** noted that many colonial buildings in rural areas served dual purposes: as administrative hubs and as symbols of British control, helping to project colonial power over local populations. The Maina building likely played such a role in Patharkandi, acting as both an administrative centre and a representation of British influence in the area.

V.II. HISTORICAL CONTEXT AND ROLE

The building's construction during the late 19th or early 20th century coincided with a period of significant administrative expansion in Assam. During the British Raj, Assam was integrated into the larger colonial administrative framework, and buildings like the one in Maina were central to the establishment of governance in rural areas. These structures were often the first point of contact between the local population and the colonial authorities, functioning as administrative offices or courts, and in some cases, residences for British officials.

Brahma (2018) emphasizes the importance of these colonial buildings in shaping local governance, as they were more than just architectural feats; they were strategic locations for enforcing colonial policies, tax collection, and dispute resolution. In

Patharkandi, the Maina building may have served similar purposes, influenced the local socio-political landscape and acted as a site of interaction between the colonizers and the local population.

V.III. CULTURAL IMPACT AND COLLECTIVE MEMORY

Over time, the building has come to hold significant cultural value for the community. It is not merely a relic of colonial rule but a part of Patharkandi's living history. Buildings of this nature often become embedded in the collective memory of local populations, serving as physical reminders of the past. In many cases, such structures symbolize resilience and adaptation, as communities repurpose them over time to suit new cultural and social needs.

The building's influence on the cultural identity of the local people is subtle yet profound. As **Saikia (2015)** points out, colonial buildings in Assam, once symbols of foreign dominance, often become absorbed into the cultural fabric of the region, reflecting a blend of colonial and indigenous heritage. In the case of the Maina building, it may now serve as a landmark or even a source of local pride, representing both the history of Patharkandi and its development through colonial and post-colonial periods.

V.IV. PRESERVATION AND CHALLENGES

Currently, one of the major concerns surrounding the Maina building is its preservation. Many colonial structures in Assam face deterioration due to lack of maintenance, changes in land use, and urban development. As an important piece of local heritage, the Maina building requires active efforts for preservation, not only to safeguard its physical structure but also to maintain its historical and cultural significance.

Preservation efforts face several challenges. First, there is often limited funding and institutional support for conserving colonial-era buildings in less prominent areas like Patharkandi. Second, many such buildings are either privately owned or repurposed for different functions, which can hinder conservation efforts. Finally, a lack of awareness about the historical importance of these structures can lead to neglect. It is crucial that both governmental and non-governmental bodies recognize the significance of preserving these architectural relics to ensure that future generations can appreciate their historical value.
